POSITION STATEMENT

QUESTION / ISSUE: Sizing Suction Piping on Public Swimming Pools Rescinding Position Statement dated June 30, 2015

DISCUSSION AND RATIONALE:

References to water velocity in suction piping have been removed from the latest edition of APSP-7. Therefore, the Position Statement dated June 30, 2015, requiring suction pipe sizing to be based on maximum pump flow, is hereby rescinded.

Suction pipe sizing (skimmers, gutters and main drains) will revert back to Rule .2518 (c) and (d) which states: "(c) Skimmer piping constructed after May 1, 2010 shall be sized to handle the maximum flow rate for the required number of skimmers, but in no case less than 100 percent of the <u>design flow rate</u>. Perimeter overflow system piping constructed after May 1, 2010 shall be sized to handle 100 percent of the <u>design flow rate</u>. The main drain piping constructed after May 1, 2010 shall be sized to handle 100 percent of the <u>design flow rate</u>. (d) Piping shall be designed to reduce friction losses to a minimum and to carry the required quantity of water at a maximum velocity not to exceed six feet per second for suction piping..."

RESPONSE / INTERPRETATION:

All suction piping (skimmers, gutters and main drains) shall be sized to handle 100 percent of the <u>design flow rate</u> without exceeding a velocity of six feet per second. The design flow rate of the pump may be estimated with an assumed total dynamic head loss of 65 feet.
