POSITION STATEMENT: Storage of Hazardous Products in a Kitchen

PURSUANT TO: The Rules Governing the Sanitation of Child Care Centers, 15A

NCAC 18A .2820 (b)

QUESTION: Can you leave the hazardous products out in the kitchen if the

kitchen is locked?

INTERPRETATION: No. Hazardous products in the kitchen must be stored in a locked

storage room or cabinet.

DISCUSSION AND RATIONAL: 15A NCAC 18A .2820 (b)

All corrosive agents, pesticides, bleaches, detergents, cleaners, polishes, any substance which may be hazardous to child if digested, inhaled, or handled shall be kept in its original container or in another labeled container, used according to manufacturer's instructions and stored in a locked storage room or cabinet when not in use. Just because the kitchen is locked does not satisfy the requirements for this rule.

15A NCAC 18A .2808 (f) Children attending child care centers shall not be in the kitchen except when participating in a supervised activity. This is another reason hazardous products should be locked in a storage room or cabinet. Child care staff should not have to make sure hazardous products are inaccessible in the kitchen before taking children in the kitchen for activities. The Attorney General's office also has indicated that a locked kitchen is not deemed to be a locked storage room or cabinet.
